2017 RCLS Annual Meeting Awards

At the RCLS Legislative Breakfast and Annual Meeting held on Friday, September 15, Annual Awards presentations were made. The following is a nomination for the *Member Library Adult Program of the Year Award*:

Program:	"VCL Holiday Craft Fair"
Nominator:	Joanne McNally
Nominating Library:	Valley Cottage Library

At Valley Cottage Library we wanted to introduce a fun-filled community event to draw people together during the holiday season. We created the "Holiday Craft Fair" where patrons could observe quality craftsmanship, talk to the artisans about their work and be able to purchase something unique and special. We felt it would be a great way to inspire people, showcase local artisans and help the arts. We wanted to attract not only our many regular patrons and families but also those residents who do not normally use the library. We had our first event in 2015, but saw the potential to make this into something really special in 2016.

Taking some lessons learned from year-one, we started promoting the show to artisans earlier in the summer to assure a high level of quality craftsmanship and originality of entries, which were reviewed by two staff members, both ceramic artists with art and design backgrounds. We advertised the fair via our newsletter and posting flyers all around Rockland County. We created a Facebook event page to keep folks posted as artists were accepted and to keep the event in mind.

We sent e-mail blasts to our Library Events List. In November we placed a 4' x 8' double-sided banner facing Route 303. We added ten lawn signs that local staff and board members, living on busy streets, displayed weeks before.

It was a group effort that took seven months to get the program together but on the day of the event we had a steady crowd of attendees. It was great to observe people of all ages gathering around and having conversations with the artisans, rekindling old friendships, meeting their neighbors and friends and for some, seeing what the library has to offer. The library felt like a real community center and was buzzing with activity. The door counter recorded over 750 which surpassed the first fair and is more

than double the count on a regular Saturday.

The response to program the has been overwhelmingly positive; from the artisans who were happy with their sales; to the patrons, new and old who communed with neighbors or picked up a unique holiday gift; to the staff who engaged with the community on a festive Saturday. The craft fair has proven to be an exciting and fun activity which we hope to continue in the years to come.
