At its Monday, June 18 meeting, the RCLS Board of Trustees had the following Talking Points:



- Gary Theodore, CPA from Nugent & Haeussler, P.C. of Montgomery spoke in regards to RCLS' annual audit. He praised RCLS's practices as being the model for libraries. He stated that the System's financial procedures are in line with state laws and requirements. No recommended changes were made.
- OverDrive will be up and running with e-magazines beginning on Wednesday, June 20.
- Signed 4 ¹/₂ year CSEA Contract. All parties are pleased with how negotiating progressed and ultimately the final outcome.
- Awarded Jody DeGroat, Library Assistant at the Albert Wisner Public Library, Warwick the Spring Management Professional Development Scholarship of \$500 for continuing her education.
- Fine Free Project will begin Saturday, September 1 with 14 member libraries. More information to come, both pros and cons on this initiative.
- RCLS renovation project is essentially completed; coming in just under budget. The Board and staff are looking at a project of comprehensive parking lot revamping.
- Save the Date Friday, September 14, 2018 for the RCLS Legislative Breakfast and Annual Meeting at The Sullivan Event Center in Rock Hill, NY.
- Save the Date Goshen Public Library and Historical Society's Topping-Off Ceremony on **Friday June 29, 2018** at the library's Salesian Park construction site from 12:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m.



Fine Free Information

An Overdue Discussion

Phil Morehart writes, "Whether to charge fines for overdue materials is a hot-button topic. The issues are many: Some libraries have halted the practice, citing concerns that fines keep patrons away, while other libraries have kept them in place as vital revenue streams. Fines are also used by some libraries as a method to teach personal responsibility, while other libraries consider that lesson outside the realm of librarianship. We spoke with a librarian on each side of the debate: Jenny Paxson and Sarah Houghton."

More Libraries are Going Fine-free

The Washington Post Editorial Board writes, "In an era when ebooks and new forms of entertainment have threatened to drive down library use, public libraries are increasingly looking to modernize and innovate. Some have turned to ebooks or digital literacy programs to reach more patrons. Others have opted for a different approach: They have gotten rid of the pesky late fees that drive borrowers away. Last week, the Enoch Pratt Free Library in Baltimore announced it was eliminating fines. This serves a laudable purpose."

✓ F3: Fine-Free Future Archived Webinar

Libraries continue to strive toward more equitable access even as many of our communities face growing income inequality-and the question of library fines has become particularly relevant. This webinar brings together three experienced library directors who have recently eliminated some or all overdue fines at their libraries to discuss the strategies they used in their communities, the arguments for and against the elimination of fines, their plans to measure impact and success, and how they communicate the issue of overdue fines as critical to any library's mission of equal access and social equity. As part of this discussion, they will share examples of how they used data to inform their fine-elimination process.

In this webinar, Beverly Choltco-Devlin will give an overview of Tacoma Public Library's experience when several patrons from multiple locations introduced bedbugs into the library through the return of dozens of heavily impacted materials. Relying heavily on the <u>Public Library</u> <u>Association</u> document on what to do (biggest message: "Don't Panic"), system staff pulled together with vigilance and determination to mitigate against a potentially disastrous outcome. As of 2016, more than 43 million immigrants were living in the US, and that number is growing. Immigration can breathe new life into the local economy as young workers replace retiring baby boomers, open new businesses, and become active consumers. Libraries can ease immigrants' transition into the community by acting as a resource hub. Asset mapping encourages libraries to go out into their communities and uncover and assess the resources available to immigrants. The information they gather gives the insight libraries need to develop programming to serve these patrons and help them thrive. This webinar will discuss how asset mapping can facilitate community entry for immigrants by helping libraries better understand the needs of this population and address those needs through service and program development.


