The SLCP is a 12 category benchmarking system that breaks down the seemingly complicated path to environmental stewardship, economic feasibility and social equity into actionable bite sized steps.

\*What is the Triple Bottom Line?

The idea that to be truly sustainable, an organization must embody practices that are environmentally sound AND economically feasible AND socially equitable.

As you progress through the SLCP you will:

- Create an organizational culture that asks the right questions about operational and outreach decisions
- Engage administration, staff and board members in a new line of thinking and collaborating
- Inspire your colleagues and community to join your efforts
- Reduce your greenhouse gases, energy intake, and waste output

Knowing how to get started with sustainability at your library can be difficult. By joining the SLCP community, you will gain tools, resources, and support that will ensure a sustainable future for library. The experience and knowledge you gain through the SLCP benchmarking program will position your library as a community leader and resource on sustainability.

## **SRP** Reports

Randall Enos, RCLS Youth Services Consultant Now that the Summer Reading Programs are starting to

wind down, it is time to think about putting your statistics

together while it is all still fresh in your mind. Reports are due by **Friday, September 21.** You are *strongly* encouraged to enter your information via the online survey. You may also



submit your report via the <u>paper form</u> to Eileen Acosta at RCLS by Friday, September 21.

If more than one person from your library is submitting information (i.e., a children's staff member and a teen staff member), please collate the information and enter it into <u>SurveyMonkey</u> as one entry rather than entering the information for each age level separately.

If you find you need to make a change on your SurveyMonkey report, contact Eileen Acosta at RCLS (eacosta@rcls.org, ext. 221). You cannot access your completed report and if you submit the information again, it makes double work for us. If you need assistance with the online form, Eileen is available to help you work through it.

Remember to send copies of promotional items, photos, and news clippings – if not previously sent. Send hard copies *only* of promotional items and news clippings (one copy only) – no electronic attachments. Photos may be sent electronically. You may include these materials with your final report, if you submit the hard copy of your report.

If you have any questions about the report form, contact Eileen or me.

Your statistics are very important. They are used for planning and we are also required to submit the information to the Division of Library Development, so we appreciate your taking the time to fill out the brief form. Much of this information is needed for your annual report in January, so by getting it together now, you're ahead of the game.








# **RCLS Directory**
