Exciting News for Small Libraries

OCLC has received a supplemental IMLS grant that will launch the next iteration of the WebJunction program [Small Libraries Create Smart Spaces](#). The original program led 15 small and rural public libraries from across the country to reimagine and reconfigure their libraries into smart spaces. The supplemental funding supports 15 more libraries through the transformation process to create smart spaces.

The application process will open in January 2019 for small and rural libraries interested in becoming a Smart Spaces library.

Big Opportunities for Small Libraries

Institute of Museum and Library Services, Nov. 29

The Institute of Museum and Library Services has launched a new special initiative, [Accelerating Promising Practices \(APP\) for Small Libraries](#), and is accepting grant applications now through **February 25**. This new funding opportunity is designed



specifically to strengthen the ability of small and rural libraries, archives, and related organizations to serve their communities, and award sizes range from \$10,000 to \$50,000. Three categories of APP grants are available: Transforming School Library Practice, Community Memory, and Digital Inclusion.

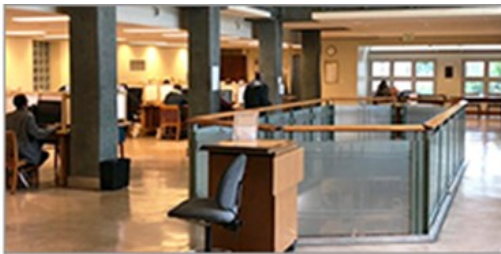

The addition will house a new program room, study room, two new bathrooms and an elevator. The entire existing building will also be renovated from roofing to flooring with all new heating and cooling systems, electric service and a newly designed circulation area. The construction is expected to take about a year.

Berkeley PL Allows Homeless Persons to Get Cards

Berkeleyside, Dec. 3

On December 1, all branches of the Berkeley (Calif.) Public Library started to issue Easy Access Cards, which are designed specifically for people who don't have a fixed address. Those wanting a card will still need a photo ID but don't have to prove they have a residence, according to a recent circulation policy update. Easy Access cardholders will be able to check out three books or other library materials at a time, put holds on three items, use library computers, and check out laptops for in-library use, said Acting Director of Library Services Elliot Warren.
