The State of America's Libraries 2019 AL: The Scoop, Apr. 7;

On April 8, ALA released *The State of America's Libraries* 2019, an annual summary of library trends released during

National Library Week, April 7-13, that outlines statistics and issues affecting all types of libraries. The report finds that library workers are on the front lines addressing community challenges, often in roles outside of traditional library service-as first responders, career counselors, social workers, teachers, and technology instructors. The report reaffirms that Libraries = Strong Communities. National Library Week this



year prompted much <u>press coverage</u>, including a <u>love letter to</u> <u>libraries</u> from a Maine patron. The Office for Intellectual Freedom tracked 347 challenges to library, school, and university materials and services in 2018. Overall, 483 books were challenged in 2018. OIF selected the <u>Top 11 Most</u> Frequently Challenged items.

FLS Randall Enos Scholarship

Boston residents can drink to the classics in Copley Square. The Boston Public Library's <u>Map Room Tea Lounge</u> opened March 20, offering tartines, desserts, and literary-inspired drinks. Perhaps the most popular beverage was "Tequila Mockingbird," a blood-orange cocktail inspired by the Harper Lee classic *To Kill a Mockingbird*. There's also the "Dorian Gray," "War and Peace," and "Mad Hatter." The cocktails are infused with flowery teas. The Catered Affair, which runs the library's dining services, worked with Cambridge-based Mem Tea and Martignetti, a wine and spirits distributor in New England.

Applications Sought for Sullivan County Poet Laureate

The Sullivan Public Library Alliance is seeking a Poet Laureate to promote "the Spirit of Sullivan County." The Poet Laureate will be an ambassador and leading voice for encouraging the appreciation of reading and writing poetry in the County. The poet laureate will engage a variety of constituencies, including both children and adults, in enriching the lives of residents by sharing and promoting poetry through conversations, readings, public appearances and digital/social media.

The term of service is one year – from June 1, 2019 to May 31, 2020. Responsibilities include presenting works of significance to Sullivan County audiences for a minimum of nine appearances over 12-month term, one in each of the nine legislative districts. Applications must include three sample poems, one of them specific to "The Spirit of Sullivan County."
