Teen Battle of the Books 2019

On Sunday, September 8, over 100 teens representing 17 libraries gathered at SUNY Orange in Middletown to participate in the RCLS Teen Battle of the Books.

The Battle of the Books (BOTB) is an annual trivia competition between RCLS libraries. Teens in grades 6-12 can participate. Every team must read the same eight books and answer questions based on details from those books. The double elimination bracket system allows for every team to participate in at least two rounds. The team that is eliminated first, gets first pick of hundreds of free books for all teen participants, and the top three teams win cash prizes.

This year's winners were, in 3rd place, Nanuet Library, New City Library in 2nd place, and the 2019 Champions were from Moffat Library of Washingtonville. There were many close games, and several new teams participated this year.

The BOTB planning committee would like to thank the many volunteers that made this program happen: Nathan DePaul, who was the question reader, and is a BOTB alum, Stephen Hoefer, timekeeper, and Jerry Kuntz, judge, from RCLS, and Matt Pfisterer from Middletown Thrall Library, who has been the Battle scorekeeper for several years. Another thank you goes out to SUNY Orange, who helps sponsor this event.

The next Battle of the Books committee meeting is scheduled for **Monday, November 4** at 9:00 a.m. at the Suffern Library. New members are always welcome.

More Than 100,000 Sign #eBooksForAll Petition

In just one month, the ALA [#eBooksForAll campaign](#) has gathered more than 100,000 signatures from readers, authors, library staff, and patrons from all 50 states to condemn Macmillan Publishers' plan to restrict library access to ebooks. Beginning November 1, Macmillan will limit libraries to purchasing only one copy of each new ebook title for the first eight weeks after its release. Additional copies will then be available for two years of access at four times the consumer price. An average of 3,000 people each day are signing the online petition, which urges Macmillan CEO John Sargent to reverse the planned embargo on ebooks sold to libraries.

ALA and libraries across the country are asking you to voice your opposition to [Macmillan's new library ebook policy](#) by signing this [petition](#) and telling Macmillan CEO John Sargent that access to ebooks should not be [delayed or denied](#).

NYS Library Digital Collections

The New York State Library Digital Collections has been upgraded to support a responsive design for viewing on all screen sizes, faster loading, a new landing page with more graphics to highlight collections, and improved indexing for more effective searching. The New York State Library began digitizing New York State government documents in 1995. The Digital Collections include some historical materials from the 18th through the early 20th century in many subject areas, including the Revolutionary War, the Civil War, Native American materials, New York State laws and natural history. While books make up the core collection, Digital Collections also include primary source materials such as letters, diaries and rare manuscripts as well as maps, music scores, and other visual materials. for the winners. The registration deadline is **Monday, November 25**.





Algorithms in Everyday Life: How Hidden Biases Impact Our Most Vulnerable Neighbors

Describes how biased thinking makes its way into computerized systems. Provides hands-on activities to help learners understand algorithms. Helps participants identify next steps for assisting impacted populations.

Computer systems are increasingly tasked with making decisions for and about human beings. They are making decisions about which ads to show us, whether or not we make it to the second round of a job interview, and even how long prison sentences should be.

These systems are reliant on algorithmic processes. Algorithms are often considered a company's "secret sauce," and usually the public doesn't know what's in them. This session will demystify the concept of an algorithm and will shed light on what we *do* know about the systems that make some of the more pressing decisions in our lives.

We will learn how our human biases are incorporated into algorithms, discuss the venues in which algorithm-based systems are pernicious, and discuss new ways of helping our communities better understand this new backdrop of machine-based decision making.

Davis Erin Anderson's work focuses on understanding the impact of technology on the culture at large, translating these challenges into real solutions for library staff. She is project lead for NYC Digital Safety, an NYC-funded program that keeps library staff informed about evergreen topics in data privacy and digital security.

Davis worked with Mozilla Foundation to review and update their web literacy curriculum, resulting in the launch of Mozilla's Core Curriculum for Web Literacy in March 2018. In addition to planning and emceeding METRO's symposia series, Davis has designed and facilitated workshops on data privacy and security, web mechanics, and personal networking skills for library staff.


