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### **RCLS Board Talking Points** At its Monday, October 21 meeting, the RCLS

At its Monday, October 21 meeting, the RCLS Board of Trustees had the following Talking Points:



- Acknowledged the successful Legislative Breakfast and Annual Meeting with 176 people in attendance representing 40 member libraries.
- Heard a report stating that in order to avoid security issues, the RCLS Automation Department is upgrading 385 ANSER computers from Windows 7 to Windows 10. In addition, 35 computers will be replaced as they are unable to be upgraded.
- Noted that RCLS continues its commitment to make sure everyone in its service area gets counted in the 2020 Census.
- Learned about the *Resilience* project taking place through the Westchester Library System, which fosters positive experiences and skills to deal with adverse childhood events. RCLS has been invited to help with the expansion of the program to the counties it serves.

The Talking Points will be elaborated on in the Minutes of the October Board meeting, which will be posted to the <u>RCLS</u> <u>website</u> about a week before the next regular meeting on **Monday, November 18** at RCLS. 



It tells the story of the Warwick Valley during the Revolutionary War using original documents, eyewitness testimony and oral traditions. Research was compiled by the author with the help of many volunteers over the past 20 years. The project is part of the Friends of Hathorn House's mission to discover the true history of Gen. John Hathorn, his militia, and the people of our area during the late 18th century.


